Cooperative strong

The strength of the electric cooperative network was on full display in early October after hurricanes Helene and Milton devastated the electric systems of cooperatives in the southeastern part of the United States.

The outstanding show of support from the electric cooperative community, who provided mutual aid crews from across the country to help those impacted by the storms, was inspiring and incredible. More than 8,000 lineworkers were deployed to help co-ops restore power and rebuild their infrastructure, and MiEnergy crews were proud to be a part of that recovery.

MiEnergy lineworkers Josh Carolan, Cole Kingsley, Tony Rislove and Zach Steinmetz joined 76 lineworkers from 18 Minnesota electric cooperatives to help restore power to electric cooperatives in South Carolina. In another round of help, Iowa electric cooperatives sent 45 lineworkers.

Mass devastation and outages impacted cooperatives in Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee and Virginia. Cooperatives from Alabama, Arkansas, Indiana, Illinois, Iowa, Maryland, Minnesota, Missouri, New Jersey, Ohio, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia and Wisconsin deployed crews to help with power restoration - which in some cases took weeks to complete.

support from as far away as Iowa, Minnesota and Wisconsin.

MiEnergy crews and neighboring electric cooperative crews from People's Energy Cooperative were delegated to support Broad River Electric Cooperative in Cowpens, South Carolina. Broad River has about the same number of members as MiEnergy (21,000) but with about half the miles of line (2,750).


Our lineworkers compared damage from Hurricane Helene to a war zone with many trees and broken poles. Many locations were inaccessible after Helene eroded away large portions of roads. Our crews reported challenges just getting to the cooperative they were assigned to help due to road closures and inaccessible communities. Their membership thought our guys talked a little funny, but joking aside, they were so grateful they came to help.

As a cooperative, we follow seven principles, one of which is Principle 6: Cooperation Among Cooperatives. We support one another. When we combine that with Principle 7: Concern for Community, it demonstrates how the founding principles are engrained in our business model with employees who are always willing to help others and the communities they serve.

BOARD DIRECTORS



MiEnergy secures \$3.16 million grant for fiber project

One of 26 projects awarded grants by DEED's border-to-border program

The Department of Employment and Economic Development (DEED) announced MiEnergy Cooperative as a recipient of its Border-to-Border Broadband Development Grant Program.

The \$3.16 million grant is for MiEnergy's Southwest Fremont project in Fillmore and Winona counties, which will bring fiber-to-the-home technology to 396 locations.

The grant program is a partnership between the State of Minnesota, MiEnergy and Mabel Cooperative Telephone Company.


MiEnergy will use the \$3.16 million grant and \$4.7 million local match to service 342 unserved and 54 underserved locations in a rural area southwest of Fremont. It will improve speeds to 1 Gbps download and 1 Gbps upload on a fiber network, exceeding the state's speed goals.

"This grant is two-fold. It brings the fastest available broadband speeds to an area where members currently have no access. It also allows us to connect our substations to fiber which means improved reliability and efficiency when delivering electricity to our members," said Jill Huffman, MiEnergy's broadband COO.

MiEnergy is no stranger to working with other entities to provide solutions to meet the needs of its members when it comes to broadband. It formed MiBroadband with Mabel Cooperative and Spring Grove Communications in 2018 to help bring broadband to rural areas. As part of this border-to-border grant, Mabel Cooperative Telephone Company is contributing \$2.37 million as a portion of the local match with MiEnergy.

"As a rural electric cooperative with less than four members per mile of power line, we've known the challenges of bringing utilities to rural areas," stated Brian Krambeer, MiEnergy's president/CEO. "Fiber is no different. Grants like these through DEED are what we need to provide this future-proof technology in low-density areas where it otherwise is not economically feasible."

MiEnergy was one of 26 projects receiving dollars in Round 10 of the state's program, which awarded \$51.9 million in grants.

MiEnergy Cooperative's Operation Round Up Trust Board met recently and elected to donate \$8,100 to the following local organizations:

- \$1,500, Fort Atkinson Firefighters Association, Fort Atkinson, Iowa, to purchase a remote-control water gun for the quick attack truck.
- \$1,170, Hokah Lions Club, Hokah, Minn., to replace picnic tables and benches at Veteran's Memorial Park.
- \$1,000, Mabel/Newburg United Methodist Church, Mabel, Minn., for Mabel-Canton K-2 teachers to purchase books for their students.
- \$1,000, Mabel Public Library, Mabel, Minn., to update public computer technology.
- \$930, Caledonia Fire Department, Caledonia, Minn., to purchase an emergency plug to shut down electric/ hybrid vehicles.
- \$750, Riceville Food Pantry, Riceville, Iowa, to restock food supplies.
- \$600, Lanesboro Arts, Lanesboro, Minn., to repair and restock the Little Free Art Library.
- \$550, Winneshiek County Conservation, Fort Atkinson, Iowa, to purchase equipment for its ice fishing education program.
- \$350, Preston Emergency Services, Preston, Minn., for individual clip-on carbon monoxide gas detectors.
- \$250, Quilters for Veterans, Castalia, Iowa, for supplies to make quilts for veterans.

Operation Round Up is funded by donations made by members of MiEnergy Cooperative who voluntarily have their electric bill round up to the next dollar. The average donation is \$6 per year, 2,300 MiEnergy members participate and 100% of the funds generated are granted to local organizations.

The program is based on the idea that small change adds up. Currently, the program gives approximately \$16,000 each year to local organizations.

The Operation Round Up Trust Board, made up of MiEnergy members, chooses where the funds get donated and the amount of the donation based on an application process. The trust board members include Neil Broadwater, of Winona; Dan Dietzenbach, of Fort Atkinson; Beth George, of Houston; Roy Kryzer, of Lewiston; Dennis Ostwinkle, of Decorah; Teresa Ross, of Hokah; Perry-O Sliwa, of Decorah; Tom Tibor, of Minnesota City; and Mike Tuohy, of Chatfield.

Donations to Operation Round Up are tax deductible. Organizations receive grants through an application process. The next application deadline is February 15.

Smart home tech on a budget

Smart technology can make it easier to save energy by simplifying or automating tasks. It can also optimize energy use to reduce waste and improve efficiency.

When upgrading to smart technology at home, consider the purchase cost as well as long-term savings. For example, you may pay a little more for a product with the latest technology, but it could result in significant savings each year and over the lifetime of the appliance.

Here are some smart devices that will take the work out of saving energy.

Smart thermostats save energy by automatically adjusting your heating or cooling system. For example, you can save as much as 10% a year on heating and cooling costs by adjusting your thermostat 7 to 10 degrees from its normal setting for eight hours a day, according to the Department of Energy (DOE).

MINNESOTA MEMBER NOTICES

MILITARY PERSONNEL ASSISTANCE LAW

When a household member has been ordered into active duty for deployment or for a change of duty station, some members may find it hard to pay their utility bills. Minnesota Law protects military personnel from shut-off if they cannot pay their bill when certain conditions are met. For more information, visit www.MiEnergy.coop or call 800-432-2285.

ELECTRIC HEAT SALES TAX EXEMPTION

Electricity sold for residential use is not taxable for the billing months of November through April when sold to metered customers in Minnesota who use it as their primary source of residential heat according to Minnesota law. If more than one type of heat is used, electricity is not taxable if it is the primary source of heat. Primary source of residential heat is the source that supplies more heat than any other sources for the largest period of time during the heating

If your property has both residential and commercial operations and only one meter for the entire building for electricity, square footage is used to determine if the residential exemption applies and is determined if more than 50 percent of the square footage of the

If you have filed an exemption card with us in the past, you do not need to file again. If your electric heat is used in conjunction with wood or another fossil fuel, please re-evaluate your heat status.

Members who receive a tax exemption when electric heat is NOT the primary source of heating are in violation of the Minnesota law. Please contact us if your heating has changed and you should be taken off the tax exemption as it is your responsibility to notify us of any changes when you are no longer eligible.

You can program a smart thermostat to change the temperature when you are asleep or away, or use a smartphone app to adjust your thermostat settings. Some models use artificial intelligence to maximize efficiency by learning your patterns and preferences. Prices range from \$80 to \$250, depending on features. Smart thermostats do not work with all heating and cooling systems, so check compatibility before you buy.

Smart lighting gives you the power to control lights in your home remotely or set a lighting schedule that fits your lifestyle. This can be beneficial for energy savings and provide home security benefits. If you or other members of your household are notorious for leaving lights on, smart lighting can help. Numerous features are available, including dimmable bulbs and color-changing effects.

Smart light switches are another budget-friendly way to control lighting. They're priced from about \$10 to \$50. Smart switches with dimmable options are available and can also control ceiling fans. Some have occupancy sensors that turn lights off when no movement is detected in a room.

A smart plug fits into any outlet to control whatever is plugged into it. Set them to automatically turn off and on or control them using a smartphone app. Prices range from \$8

A wide variety of smart shades, curtains and blinds are available, including styles with integrated controls. You can also add smart controls to your existing blinds or curtains. Both options allow you to adjust the tilt of blinds and open or close curtains. Set a schedule, control them remotely or use a voice command paired with a voice assistant, such as Alexa or Google Home. This allows you to reduce cooling needs in the summer and heating needs in the winter. Smart controls start at around \$70. To save the most energy, prioritize windows with the most incoming light.

Upgrading to smart home technologies can make it easy to use less energy at home. Choose options that make the most sense for your lifestyle to optimize savings.

MINI-SPLITS AT A GLANCE

Mini-split systems, also known as ductless air-source heat pumps, heat/cool a home through an outdoor unit that connects to one or more individual indoor air handlers, which are typically mounted on a wall. Depending on the size of your home and personal preferences, a mini-split system is worth considering when you need to replace or upgrade your heating/cooling system.

Mini-Split System Benefits:

- Zone-controlled heating/cooling
- Higher energy efficiency ratings
- Easy to install
- Good for heating/cooling home additions

Mini-Split System Considerations:

- Potentially higher upfront cost
- Appearance
- May require electrical upgrades
- Not as effective in large spaces

- Use smaller appliances like slow cookers instead of the oven.
